Things like favorite foods, sports they love to play, favorite day of the week, first language, home life, etc. Encourage students to try to find things that are not obvious as they are both in your class together, or who live in the ABC city. #14: What can you cook? Is there a food you can cook really well and your family or friends love to eat? It can also be something very simple. Do you have any advice for anyone else who wants to do this? #15: What do you want to learn? If you had 10 free hours a week, and you could learn 1 new skill, what would it be and why? #16: Dream Job What is your ideal job? Why? This is one of the most interesting ESL conversation questions for high school or university students. #17: If the school was free, and you got paid a basic salary to attend, could you never stop being a student? Why or why not? Or, could you have a job? #18: Movies, Books and TV Shows What do you spend your time watching or reading?
